July is National Grilling Month

Consider food safety when cooking and eating outdoors

The aroma of food on a grill and the scent of freshly mowed lawns signal summertime to me.

Even if mowing lawn is not part of your regular summertime routine, enjoying grilled food probably is.

July is National Grilling Month, so we have plenty of time to celebrate the great outdoors with delicious food, well into colder

Do you have an outdoor grill in your household? If so, what are your favorite foods to prepare?

About 100 million grills are present in U.S. households according to a major grill manufacturer. That adds up to 60% of households. In fact, one third of households with grills have multiple grills.

Further, if you live in Midwestern or Southern states, you are very likely to grill foods in the summer. According to survey research, we love to grill hamburgers in the Midwest, but steak is another favorite.

Are you the grill master or assistant grill master in your household? I am content bringing trays of meats and vegetables to my resident grill master to cook.

When food preparation and eating move outdoors, we have some safety considerations. For

example, be especially careful when cleaning your grill prior to adding food. A wire brush can leave bristles behind, which could find its way into your food.

More than 1,700 emergency room visits occurred in the U.S. due to grill brush bristle injuries between 2002 and 2014. About one-fourth of those affected were admitted to the hospital.

Many tools are available to clean your grill from wooden grill scrapers to bristle-free brushes. Crumpled aluminum foil can be used to remove burned-on food after the grill cools.

Almost any food can be grilled. Depending on the grill, you can add a smoky flavor to pizza, vegetables and fruits, besides all types of protein foods such as beef, pork, chicken, lamb and fish.

Be sure to bring your food thermometer to the grill. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, we should cook ground beef burgers to 160 F, chicken to 165 F and fish until it flakes with a fork and/or reaches 145 F. Steaks and chops should reach 145 F, with a three-minute rest time away from the heat

A clean serving plate to retrieve the cooked food from the grill helps prevent cross-contamination and maintains food safety. If you marinate foods, keep out serve with the food. Marinades that have touched raw meat, poultry and seafood contain harmful bacteria.

Consider these tips to include a variety of foods on your grilling menu:

- Rinse produce and prepare for grilling. Remove the stems, seeds and cores from fruits and vegetables before
- When preparing whole fruits or vegetables, cut them into slices unless otherwise spec-
- Prepare bell peppers by cutting off the top and bottom of the pepper. Remove the core and then cut the pepper in half from top to bottom. (This way, you end up with two flat rectangles that are grilled skin side down.)
- When using skewers, choose vegetables and fruits of like thickness and water content. Cut them the same size to ensure even cooking.
- Use separate plates and utensils for raw meats and fruits or vegetables to prevent cross-contamination.
- Take your time and be patient. You may think you are burning something and remove it before it is done.

Sprinkle wedges of apple or pear with cinnamon and a touch of brown sugar. Grill for about five minutes per

- Brush peeled, whole bananas with canola or sunflower oil and add to the grill just until the fruit turns golden and has grill marks, or about five minutes per side.
- For a fun alternative to the summer classic s'mores, cut a ¾-inch-deep slit down the length of an unpeeled banana. Pry the slit open and stuff with 2 tablespoons of chopped dark chocolate or your favorite candy bar. Wrap the banana in foil and grill for about five minutes on each side.
- Grill peaches and nectarines for a side dish to go with steak or pork tenderloin. After cooking, the fruit can be diced and made into a salsa or relish by adding fresh herbs, chili peppers, and lime juice or vinegar.

One of my favorite side items for a grilled menu is corn on the cob. Although many techniques exist, this is one that we use.

Grilled Corn on the Cob

Peel back the husk, but don't remove. Remove the silk and close the husk back up. Submerge the corn in water for about 15 minutes. While the corn is soaking, fire up the grill. Remove the corn from the water and shake out any excess water.

Note: If you wish to season the corn before cooking, you can pull back the husk and add your favorite seasonings. Be sure to close the husks and twist shut before placing the corn on the grill. If using a charcoal grill, turn the corn every 10 to 15 minutes. For gas grills, keep the heat on medium-high and turn every five minutes.

The husks will turn brown and even may start on fire. Let them cook, turning the corn often. The water that they soaked in is steaming the corn from inside the husk. Corn usually takes about 30 to 45 minutes; after grilling a few times, you will get a feel for how long they need.

When done, use a tong to remove the corn from the grill (they are very hot!). Peel back the husks. You may want to run the corn under hot water to remove any ash. Some people eat their corn plain; others use a little butter with some salt and pepper. Others like Sriracha (hot) sauce. For a new twist, try mixing some olive oil with your favorite seasonings and brush it onto the hot



Norman County, in partnership with MSR&PC, which directs the state's soybean checkoff resources, continues the Stepping Up campaign to promote the value-added uses of soybeans and make community connections. This spring, the Norman County Soybean & Corn Growers Association donated 15 pairs to Benedictine Living Center in Ada and 16 pairs to Halstad Living Center. Both facilities also received shoes from Norman County soybean farmers in 2022.

"We are so thankful for all those that worked the frontline during COVID, and it is wonderful to give back," Board President Corey Hanson said. "I am so touched by the appreciation of all those that received Skechers as a thank you. It was great to be able to give Skechers to those who did not receive shoes last year." The continuation of the Stepping Up campaign aims to inform more consumers on the value that soybeans bring to the market, along with the crop's versatility. Minnesota farmers also want to honor groups and organizations in their communities that are making a difference.

"The Council is proud to continue the Stepping Up promotion and give back to those who serve our communities," Council Chair Tom Frisch said. "It's a win-win for our county boards because we're able to connect with our neighbors while also showing the value of the soybean checkoff."

In summer 2022, more than 53 counties around Minnesota participated in the first Stepping Up campaign. In 2022 alone, Minnesota farmers and the soybean checkoff donated nearly 3,000 pairs of Skechers soy-based shoes across 120 Minnesota health care facilities.

Youth tractor and farm safety training teaches youth 14 years and older about safe equipment operation and general farm safety. Students who participate in the program will:

Beware of grasshoppers

Now is the time to prepare for the coming grasshopper invasion.

Grasshoppers were devastating in Dakota gardens last year. They devoured many plants from top to bottom.

Now the pests are coming back again. What caused this?

The weather during the past two years has been perfect for grasshoppers.

First, grasshoppers love a long, warm summer. This gives the insects plenty of

time to eat, mate and lay lots of eggs. Last summer was long and warm. We had huge swarms of grass-hoppers to begin with, and they feasted and laid a tremendous number of eggs. One female grasshopper can lay more than 1,000 eggs. A population explosion was waiting to happen this spring.

Second, grasshoppers want a late spring. If they get an early spring, their eggs

hatch too early and die from a cold snap. We had a late spring this year and many baby grasshoppers avoided frosty, cold weather.

Third, grasshoppers enjoy a warm, dry spring. This provides the young grasshoppers with food and protects them from diseases. The month of May was one of the warmest ever. Food was abundant. Although the month was moist, rains

were quickly absorbed by our parched soils.

Swarms of young grasshoppers are emerging out of brushy areas and ditches now. They don't have wings yet, but they can hop over three feet at a time.

The pests are heading for our gardens where they will find moisture and succulent plants to feast upon.

Among vegetables, grasshoppers particularly enjoy eating lettuce, onions, carrots, beans and corn. Among flowers, grasshoppers prefer eating sunflowers, iris, daylily, canna lily and roses.

Now is the time to prepare for the invasion. You can spray the ditches and brushy areas where they are emerging. If you see hoppers near your garden, you can spray the borders. Spray a 10-foot swath to deter the pests.

Grasshoppers are a destructive foe. We need to show them no mercy. Once they enter our garden, we need to fight back.

I prefer to kill pests using organic insecticides. These chemicals are generally safer to use, cause less harm to bees and other beneficial insects, and don't last long in the environment.

Spinosad is a great organic product, but it cannot control grasshoppers. Pyrethrin only works for a day or two. That's not long enough.

Insecticidal soap has to be sprayed on the pest itself to kill it. Good luck spraying soap on swarms of jumping grasshoppers.

I tried spraying organic neem to protect my crops last year. It lessened the damage for a few days, but the pests came back in full force. I have since learned that neem is most effective on very young grasshoppers.

After my organic strategy failed, I got out the big guns.

Pyrethroids and carbaryl are our most effective weapons. These synthetic insecticides are popular and available at all garden centers. Pyrethroids include zeta-cypermethrin, cyfluthrin, bifenthrin, lambda-cyhalothrin and esfenvalerate. Look at the label and its list of active ingredients.

These chemicals are powerful and long lasting. They can give you 7 to 14 days of protection.

Use carefully because these synthetic insecticides are toxic to us. Follow the instructions on the label, and there will be a waiting period between spraying and harvesting.

These products are toxic to bees. You can reduce harming bees by spraying in the evening when bees are not active and targeting the leaves of flowering plants.

Humans have been battling grasshoppers for centuries. This year is no different. Grasshoppers are gathering in huge swarms. Get ready for battle.

Nominations Open for the 2023 County **Committee Elections**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepting nominations for county committee members and encourages all farmers, ranchers, and FSA program participants to take part in the Norman County Committee election nomination process.

Elections will occur in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for members. LAAs are elective areas for FSA committees in a single county or multi-county jurisdiction. For Norman County, elections will take place in LAA #2, which consists of Lockhart, Spring Creek, Pleasant View, Green Meadow, McDonaldsville, Lake Ida, Winchester, and Rockwell townships. Customers can identify which LAA they or their farming or ranching operation is in by using our new GIS locator tool available at fsa.usda.gov/ elections.

County committee members make important decisions about how Federal farm programs are administered locally. All nomination forms for the 2023 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by August 1, 2023.

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in a USDA program and reside in the LAA that is up for election this year, may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others and qualifying organizations may also nominate candidates. USDA

encourages minority producers, women, and beginning farmers or ranchers to nominate, vote and hold office.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agricultural community serve on FSA county committees. The committees are made up of 3 to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Committee members are vital to how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

Low Interest Emergency Physical Loss Loans Available for Producers in **Norman County**

Agricultural producers in Norman County who lost property due to recent natural disasters are eligible for physical loss loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) offers these loans for losses caused by excessive snow that occurred January 1, 2023 through April 21, 2023.

FSA is offering these low-interest emergency loans to producers with a qualifying loss. Approval is limited to applicants who suffered severe physical losses only, including the loss of buildings and livestock. The deadline for producers in designated primary and contiguous counties to apply for loans for physical losses is January 30, 2024.

Physical loss loans can help producers repair or replace damaged or destroyed physical property essential to the success of the agricultural operation, including livestock losses. Examples of property commonly affected include essential farm buildings, fixtures to real estate, equipment, livestock, perennial crops, fruit and nut bearing trees, and harvested or stored crops and hay.

USDA Announces Corrections to Emergency Relief Program Policy to More Accurately Reflect 2020 and 2021 Natural Disaster Impacts on Crops Intended for On-Farm Use

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is updating the Emergency Relief Program (ERP) Phase Two to provide a method for valuing losses and accessing program benefits to eligible producers of certain crops, including grapes grown and used by the same producer for wine production or forage that is grown, stored and fed to livestock, that do not generate revenue directly from the sale of the crop. These updates ensure that ERP benefits are more reflective of these producers' actual crop losses resulting from 2020 and 2021 natural disaster events. USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) is accepting ERP Phase Two applications from eligible wine grape and forage producers including the technical correction to ERP. The deadline to submit applications for ERP Phase Two is July 14th.

Background

In January 2023, FSA announced ERP Phase Two, designed to wrap-up and fill remaining gaps in previous natural disaster assistance for 2020 and 2021.

To be eligible for ERP Phase Two, producers must have suffered a decrease in allowable gross revenue in 2020 or 2021 due to necessary expenses related to losses of eligible crops from a qualifying natural disaster event. Assistance is primarily for producers of crops that were not covered by Federal Crop Insurance or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program since crops covered by Federal Crop Insurance and NAP were included in the assistance under ERP Phase One administered in 2022.

Determining Crop Value

Producers of certain crops now have a method for including crop value in their allowable gross revenue for the purpose of determining ERP Phase 2 benefits.

The value of the eligible crop intended for on-farm use will be based on the producer's actual production of the crop and a price for the crop as determined by FSA's Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs based on the best available data for each crop such as published crop price data or the average price obtained by other producers in the area. Acceptable, published sources including but are not limited to Federal Crop Insurance Corporation established prices, FSA established National Crop Table prices and National Agricultural Statistic Service prices.

Revenue and pricing guidelines for expected revenue for wine grapes and on-farm forage is available online for producer reference and convenience when applying for ERP Phase Two.

Wine grape and forage producers who have already submitted their ERP Phase Two applications to FSA have the option of revising the application and updating their allowable gross revenue to include crop value if applicable.

Producers of crops grown for on-farm use other than wine grapes and forage may request consideration to use a crop's value in their allowable gross revenue. Submit requests to RA.FSA.DCWA2.ppb@wdc.usda.gov. FSA's Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs will review submitted requests.

More Information

FSA offers an online ERP tool to help producers determine what is considered allowable gross revenue..

Producers should contact their local FSA office to make an appointment to apply for ERP Phase Two. Producers should also keep in mind that July 15th is a major deadline to complete acreage reports for most crops. FSA encourages producers to complete the ERP Phase Two application and acreage report during the same office visit. Applications for the Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program, a revenue-based program for losses resulting from the pandemic, can also be completed.

Storm Reporting Assistance

As we move through the growing season, producers are asked to report weather events that cause significant damage to crops, livestock and or buildings. This information will be used to assess damages to determine what type of federal assistance is needed. Reports, as well as pictures, can be sent to james.kruize@usda.gov.

Conservation Reserve Program

<u>CRP - Primary Nesting Season</u> - The primary nesting season starts June 1st and runs through August 1st. Mid Contract Management activities will now need to be on hold until this timeline lapses. Contract holders should refrain from mowing or spraying unless you contact FSA to receive

permission to spot spray or mow any weeds or control any rodents. We would also advise contract holders to take some time and scout your CRP acreage throughout the year to ensure you do not have volunteer trees or noxious weeds popping up. It is your responsibility to maintain your CRP practice and failure to do so could result in penalties of noncompliance up to and including contract termination.

The **Continuous CRP Signup** is now underway for new offers. Under the continuous CRP signup, environmentally sensitive land devoted to certain conservation practices can be enrolled in CRP at any time. Offers for continuous enrollment are not subject to competitive bidding during specific periods. Instead they are automatically accepted provided the land and producer meet certain eligibility requirements and the enrollment levels do not exceed the statutory cap. A new practice established under the 2018 Farm Bill is CP43 Prairie Strips which could be used on perimeter of fields to replace conservation issues with headlands, irrigation corners, and salinity areas on cropland

Transitioning Expiring CRP Land to Beginning, Veteran or Underserved Farmers and Ranchers

CRP contract holders are encouraged to transition their Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres to beginning, veteran or socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers through the Transition Incentives Program (TIP). TIP

provides annual rental payments to the landowner or operator for up to two additional years after the CRP contract expires.

CRP contract holders no longer need to be a retired or retiring owner or operator to transition their land. TIP participants must agree to sell, have a contract to sell, or agree to lease long term (at least five years) land enrolled in an expiring CRP contract to a beginning, veteran, or socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher who is not a family member.

Beginning, veteran or social disadvantaged farmers and ranchers and CRP participants may enroll in TIP beginning two years before the expiration date of the CRP

contract. The TIP application must be submitted prior to completing the lease or sale of the affected lands. New landowners or renters that return the land to production must use sustainable grazing or farming methods.

Farm Storage Facility Loans

Did you know FSA's Farm Storage Facility Loan Program (FSFL) can help you with your storage and handling needs? As you plan for this year's harvest, are you thinking that you really could use a truck, grain cart, sugar beet cart, auger, or another piece of equipment to meet your handling needs? Do you need additional storage?

Then why don't you give our FSFL program a chance to help you:

- Acquire new or used storage and handling trucks;
- Acquire portable or permanently affixed storage and handling equipment; and/or
- Acquire new storage bins.

A variety of structures, handling equipment, and trucks are eligible under this loan, including dryers, augers, trucks – new & used, grain trailers (hopper, live bottom, end dump), including semi tractors, baggers, bale wrappers, grain carts, sugar beet carts, forklifts and skid steers, bulk tanks, propane


tanks, hay barns, facilities for cold storage, storage, drying, & handling facilities, and many more options available.

A producer may borrow up to \$500,000 per loan, with a minimum down payment of 15 percent. Loan terms range from 3 to 12 years, depending on the amount of the loan with favorable interest rates (3.50% - 3.75%) currently. Producers must demonstrate storage needs based on three years of production history for storage facilities. FSA also provides a microloan option that, while available to all eligible farmers and ranchers, also should be of particular interest to new or small producers where there is a need for financing options for loans up to \$50,000 at a lower down payment with reduced documentation. Applicants for all loans will be charged a nonrefundable \$100 application fee.

If there is construction required, which would include ground disturbance such as site preparation, an environmental review must be completed before actions are approved. Contact your local FSA office early in your planning process to determine what level of environmental review is required for your program application so that it can be completed timely.

Volunteer Firefighters

Time and again, whether in the dead of the night, the middle of a blizzard, or in the midst of a searing summer heat wave, volunteer firefighters arrive at the scene and willingly place themselves in harm's way in order to protect the lives and property of their friends, neighbors, and even complete strangers. The brave men and women who comprise America's volunteer firefighters are regular people with regular jobs who take time out of their lives to safeguard their neighborhoods and communities, occasionally making the ultimate sacrifice when tragedy strikes, all without any expectation of compensation or recognition for their courageous efforts. It is this selfless commitment to service, this enduring devotion to duty and community, that makes volunteer firefighters Authentic American Heroes.

FMS

This issue is also dedicated to honoring EMS providers for their dedication to the health and safety of our community.

Communities rely on volunteer emergency medical responders (EMR) and emergency medical technicians (EMT) to provide initial and early personal emergency medical care.

They are available to be paged out on a moment's notice to respond to medical calls, motor vehicle accidents, and other services where emergency medical attention is needed. First responders provide emergency first aid, triage and first aid support at public events, and support firemen by monitoring their medical health during fire calls.

First responders help bridge the gap between ambulance page and arrival, often being able to initiate care and prepare patients for transport. All first responders in the Lakes Area are volunteers.

They are required to attend trainings, exercises and monthly meetings in order to maintain EMR certification.

Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer member of a local squad should contact their local city office.



Military

We pay tribute to all military personnel, from every service branch, and from every time period in American History. These are the brave men and women that have sacrificed to keep this nation free for the last 239 years and they deserve our respect. Osteoarthritis

Osteoarthritis is a degenerative condition characterized by the breakdown and eventual loss of cartilage in the joints.

One common area where osteoarthritis occurs is the big toe. The big toe makes it possible for you to walk and run upright, absorbing forces equal to nearly twice your body weight when walking. With all it endures, it's no surprise that overuse can erode cartilage, causing serious pain and even physical deformities. Nevertheless, many people confuse big toe arthritis, also known as hallux rigidus, with bunions.

Early signs of hallux rigidus include pain and stiffness during use, or during cold, damp weather, difficulty with activities like running and squatting, and swelling and inflamAdditional symptoms may develop over time, including pain during rest, bone spurs, limping, and dull pain in the hip, knee or lower back due to changes

If you notice any of these symptoms, see a foot and ankle surgeon. Conservative treatments like shoe modifications, orthotic devices and physical therapy, may prevent or postpone the need for surgery. If you have mid- to end-stage arthritis in your foot or ankle, you may require next steps, such as ground-breaking cartilage regeneration treatment, implant surgery or the surgical removal of damaged cartilage and spurs, all of which have quick recovery periods.

"People with this disorder tend to suffer much longer than they need to,"

mation around the joint. says Dr. Butto. "They're often pleasantly surprised when they find out their problem can be fixed."

Rheumatoid Arthritis

Rheumatoid arthritis (RA) is a disease in which certain cells of the immune system malfunction and attack healthy joints. Foot problems caused by RA commonly occur in the ball of the foot near the toes, although RA can also affect other areas of the foot and ankle. The most common signs and symptoms are pain, swelling, joint stiffness and difficulty walking, as well as a range of deformities, including rheumatoid nodules, dislocated toe joints, hammertoes, bunions, heel pain, Achilles tendon pain and flatfoot ankle pain.

As part of a team that includes a primary doctor or rheumatologist, your foot and ankle surgeon will develop a treatment plan aimed at relieving associated pain, which may include orthotic devices, accommodative shoes, aspiration of fluid build-up and steroid injections. When RA produces foot pain and deformities not relieved through other treatments, surgery may be required.

"Listening to your body and seeing a foot and ankle surgeon are so important. With today's scientific advances, treatment can reduce pain and restore you to your previous mobility, strength and functionality," says Dr. Butto.

History Matters

Baseball was the game of choice in 1885

Baseball was the game of choice in 1885. All the towns in the Red River Valley had good teams. Ada played Grand Forks, Moorhead, Fargo and Crookston. I quote A.O. Rolfe, one of Ada's players in that year: "The tightest game played was against Grand Forks on the Crookston grounds...with the score tied in the ninth and Ada having all the bases filled, I went to bat. A lucky swing and I clouted the three-bagger which won the game. Returning to Ada, the team and the fans had a banquet at the Ada House, and it was some celebration, too."

The most famous of all Ada's baseball players was Walter Wilmot who played in Ada in 1881 when Ada took the amateur championship of the northwest part of Minnesota. He played professional ball in 1884 in St. Paul, and with the Washington Senators in 1887. From there he went to the Chicago "White Stockings" from 1890 to 1895. He managed the Minneapolis-St. Paul team from 1896-1900.

Our fourth Mr. Baseball is Anthony Sipe. He spent his early years in the village of Lockhart. He attended school and church there and grew up helping his dad in the blacksmith shop and pool hall. He graduated from Ada High School in 1935, following which he worked at the Maas Store and the Lockhart Bank.

Following a stint in the Army during WWII, Tony returned to banking, a career that lasted 55 years.

Baseball was always his first love when it came to sports. He played on the Lockhart team, and then with the Ada A's team for 15 years. He became involved with Legion Baseball as a manager and remained with those teams for 35 years. The Baseball field in Ada is dedicated to him. In 1986 he was inducted into the Minnesota Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame in St. Cloud. He passed away in 2011.

One of his hobbies earned him the nickname "Batman". Tony collected 150 cracked bats, a number of which were signed by some of the biggest names in the business: Jackie Robinson, Willy Mays, Mickey Mantle, Ted Williams and Al Kaline. His personal favorite, a Nelson Fox Louisville Slugger. Unhappily, he loaned it to someone else and they cracked it. We have one of the 150 bats at the museum, along with Tony's uniform, the matching uniform that Clarabelle made for Tim, and the ring that he received when he was inducted. Stop in and see what we've collected, and learn more about sport in Norman County. It has obviously "mattered" for our 138 years.




